

October Evergreen Camera Club Program presented by Bob Dean

How well do you know our state? Do you know the fascinating history and the secret

places to go and photograph? Bob Dean gave an excellent overview of 13 Colorado mountain towns, the historic background and what each town has to offer photograph-

ically. Bob divided his presentation into regions, covering the Pike's Peak, San Luis Valley, Arkansas River Valley and the San Juan Mountains. Along the way he covered ghost towns to vibrant tourist towns such

as Bonanza, Cripple Creek and St. Elmo.

Bob offered details such as the best place to find interesting outhouses (St. Elmo), most whimsical town (Guffey), where to find "Broken Nose"

Scotty's hangout (Leadville) and more about the now-extinct Colorado furry trout (Silverton).

Many of the towns flourished during the 1860s silver boom, attracting characters such as the slippery con man Soapy Smith, scout and gambler Bat Masterson and the ravenous Alferd Packer. Bob gave an interesting account of Packer's history, his trial in Lake City, and posed new questions about his cannibalistic guilt.

The 1890 Sherman Silver Act caused the price of silver to plummet from \$1.16/ounce to \$0.69/ounce that year and towns began to fold soon after or find other ways to survive.
